ARAGON: The Belchite Steppes, Los Monegros and the Pyrenees

We arrived on time in **Barcelona** via our scheduled *EasyJet* flight from **Stansted** (£89rtn each). We picked up our Fiat Bravo (*Diesel*) from **AVIS** (£58 each) and were on our way at 1145h. We picked up the A2 for the 3 hour journey to El Planeron in the steppe country. Along the way **Ring-necked Parakeet** flew over and **White Storks** were more numerous from **Alcarras** onwards.

Our first planned stop at Llano De Las Menorcas produced 3+ nesting Lesser Kestrel, 3+ Spotless Starling, Rock Dove and a Red-billed Chough. As we approached Bujaraloz by early afternoon the first of many Marsh Harrier and Black Kite were seen and 2 light-phase Booted Eagle. Along the B1105 to Gelsa we saw 2 Black-eared Wheatear and the first of many Crested Lark and Corn Bunting. As we approached El Planeron, we made our way slowly along the minor road and saw 25+ Calandra Lark, 12+ Lesser Short-toed Lark, 6 Black-eared Wheatear and a Whinchat.

We reached **El Planeron SEO** at 1845h. Would did not hear or see any Dupont's Lark, but we did see female **Montagu's Harrier**, a pair of **Stone Curlew** with 2 large downy chicks, **2 Black-bellied Sandgrouse** and **Little Owl**. We checked in to our Hotel in **Quinto** as **4 Bee-eater** flew over. After an excellent dinner, we took a walk near the local allotments nearby and saw **2 White Stork** in a colossal nest, **4 Black Kite**, **1 Hobby.** We heard several **Cetti's Warbler**, **Nightingale** and **Serin**.

Day 2 – Thu 01May08

We returned to **El Planeron SEO** at 0600h, well before dawn and were quickly rewarded with the song of 4+ **Dupont's Lark.** We scanned carefully for the next 2 hours. Although we did not see any Dupont's we did see **Lesser Kestrel, Woodchat Shrike, Southern Grey Shrike, Brown Hare** and **Red Fox**. After returning to Quinto for an excellent breakfast, we collected our picnic lunch, checked out of the Hotel Rioja and returned to El Planeron. At 0920 the Dupont's were still in song. We then chanced upon a group of ringers. They spoke no English, so I used my patchy French to chat to them. They invited us to watch and it soon became apparent that they were not only ringing in the bushes, but catching and ringing juvenile Dupont's Lark using traps buried in the ground. This large slice of luck allowed us to spend the next 2 hours enjoying views in the hand of **Dupont's Lark, Bonelli's Warbler** and **Pied Flycatcher**. We scanned the area in between the ringing and saw **18+ Griffon Vulture, 2 Red-legged Partridge, 2 Pin-tailed Sandgrouse** and several **Apollo** butterflies.

We moved off north. An immature **Bonelli's Eagle** was a good find over the steppe and a **Blackwinged Stilt** was at some roadside pools near **Candasnos**. We headed towards **Ballobar** in search of Little Bustard in **Los Monegros**. Early morning was probably best for this area and although we explored well in to the afternoon, we dipped, but not before enjoying good views of female **Montagu's Harrier**, **2 Stone Curlew**, **6 Pin-tailed Sandgrouse**, **1 Great Spotted Cuckoo**, **3 Hoopoe**, **2 Blackeared Wheatear** and numerous **Calandra Lark**.

A short picnic stop at the bridge over the Rio Alcanadre at Ontinena was productive: Night Heron, Common Sandpiper, 16 Bee-eater, Common Cuckoo, Zitting Cisticola and 6+ Nightingale. We then moved on to Sarinena Lake. It took a while to find, but once there we enjoyed a busy hour with several Little and Great Crested Grebe, 8 Grey Heron, 2 Purple Heron, 6+ Cattle Egret, 6 Black Tern, Water Rail heard, a Great Reed Warbler and a Bearded Tit heard. By 1800h we reached the beautiful Somontano area. We travelled through the villages checking out the cereal fields and any perches for an outside chance of Black-shouldered Kite. No luck, but we did see Crag Martin, Woodchat and loads of Crested Lark, Spotless Starling, Serin and Corn Bunting.

We arrived at the **Boletas Birdwatching Centre** in **Loporzano** near **Huesca** at 1845. We were greeted by Esther who showed us our room for the next 3 nights. We enjoyed an excellent evening meal with some fine local red wine. BB&EM + picnic worked out at about £40 each per night. We cannot speak highly enough of the wonderful hospitality we received there. Apart from petrol, we spent little else, excellent value!

Day 3 – Fri 02May08

A pre-breakfast walk around the village and cereal fields in Loporzano: Griffon Vulture, Egyptian Vulture, 2 Quail calling, 1 Wryneck, 1 Melodious Warbler, 1 Redstart, 1 Whinchat, several Nightingale and male Golden Oriole were the highlights. After breakfast we moved up to the local cemetery, where we saw Tawny Pipit, Woodlark, Black-eared Wheatear and Woodchat Shrike.

En route to the **Hecho valley** in the Pyrenees **Griffon Vultures** became more numerous. We also saw several **Red Kite**, **Crag Martin** and a **Jay**. After a long drive up on a switchback track, we reached the refuge at **Gabardito** at 1140. We were immediately greeted with excellent views of a pair of **Citril Finch** in the car park. As we made our way up the valley we encountered several **Firecrest**, **Crested Tit**, **Treecreeper**, **Coal Tit** and **Chaffinch**.

We watched the steep cliff faces where Wallcreeper are supposed to be frequent. Our luck did not hold here, but we had some good birding nonetheless: 2 Lammergeier flew over, numerous Griffon Vulture, 1 Egyptian Vulture, 2 Booted Eagle, 1 Alpine Swift, Green Woodpecker (sharpei) heard, Garden Warbler, Chiffchaff and many Red-billed Chough. Back at the car park later on, as we picnicked, we saw a Nuthatch and then 3 Citril Finch, 1 Camberwell Beauty, Orange-Tip, Painted Lady, Common Blue and Brimstone.

We returned south and stopped off near Huesca at Montearagon Castle. Although it was 1730h, it was very hot. We quickly found a pair of Black Wheatear and enjoyed excellent views. We finished the day off in Loporzano. At the cemetery there was much activity, mainly in the scrub and we saw 1 Egyptian Vulture, 1 Booted Eagle, 2 Tawny Pipit, 4+ Western Orphean Warbler, 1 Subalpine Warbler, 1 Sardinian Warbler, a pair of Cirl Bunting, Grass Snake and Brown Hare. After dinner 2100-2200h we got very close to 4 Scops Owl calling in the village but could not see any. Later we saw a Barn Owl which was screeching as it quartered the local fields.

Day 4 - Sat03May08

Loporzano Cemetery before breakfast: singing Thekla Lark, Western Orphean Warbler, Subalpine Warbler and Stonechat.

We made our way north to the French border at **Portalet**. There were still a few feet of snow in the pass, which was a good omen, even if the walk up was difficult. We saw several **Marmot** and **Chamois** as we made our way up the valley. There was plenty of bird activity around the streams and melted areas and we quickly noted **2 Black-bellied Dipper**, **6+ Water Pipit**, **20+ Northern Wheatear**, **3 Black Redstart**, **2 Red-billed Chough** and **30+ Alpine Chough**. After a mile or so we stopped to scan and I got on to some birds which flew down from on high, disturbed by some skiers. They were **3 Snowfinch!** They landed on the slopes and fed for about 45 minutes. Brilliant! To cap it all Nev found **3 Alpine Accentor** on an adjacent ridge, making it a very successful day out.

On the way back down we checked out the **Boca Del Infierno** where some birders had recently reported Wallcreeper. We also tried the **walls of both dams along the A136** where Nev had enjoyed great views on a previous trip in 2006. No luck at those sites. I'd had outrageous luck with this species on a previous trip to the French Alps in 2004. Neither of us were really too disappointed. I'd finally put to rest my unfinished business of Citril Finch, Snowfinch and Alpine Accentor from that trip!

We headed back to **Loporzano** and saw **2 Red Kite** near Sabinanago and re-visited **Montearagon Castle** to again enjoy prolonged views of the **Black Wheatear** pair. At 1530h Nev spotted a **Short-toed Eagle** near Loporzano village. We then drove up to **St. Julian de Banzo** and saw **Sardinian Warbler**, **Subalpine Warbler** and **Bonelli's Warbler** in the dense cover near the top of the valley. We also scanned across to **Salto de Roldan** and saw **50+ Griffon Vulture** and **2 Raven** soaring.

We took a late siesta back at **Boletas** 1700-1830h, then refreshed, birded **Loporzano cemetery** again. We saw pretty much the same as previous visits; it is really such a great stretch of habitat that can merit several hours' coverage. A male **Cirl Bunting** was singing there, but we could not locate any Eagle Owl at dusk. Tired, we did not bother searching out for any Red-necked Nightjar and as we drove back to **Boletas**, we flushed a **Quail** from the edge of a field, which proved to be Nev's only lifer of the trip!

Day 5 – Sun04May08

We headed back west via the vineyards and cultivated fields near Gurrea de Gallego and Almoduvar in search of Little Bustards, to no avail. However, we did see 2 Marsh Harrier, a family group of 5 Little Owl, 1 Yellow Wagtail, 2 Zitting Cisticola and 3 Whinchat. Ontinena Bridge produced similar birds to Day 2 plus a Little Ringed Plover. We re-checked the cultivated areas east of Km 54-56 of the A2214 near Ballobar, again pretty much the same birds as Day 2 plus 2 Black-bellied Sandgrouse, 3 Hoopoe, 2 Great Spotted Cuckoo, 1 Spectacled Warbler, 2 Spanish Festoon, Painted Lady, and no sign of any Bustards.

We stopped mid-afternoon at Candasnos lagoon. It was very hot, but there were plenty of birds there including 20+ Black-necked Grebe, 1 Pochard, numerous Red-crested Pochard, 2 Cattle Egret, 30+ Black-winged Stilt, 1 Wood Sandpiper, 6 Black Tern and several Great Reed Warbler. We finished birding around 6pm as 4 Ring-necked Parakeet flew over the motorway near Barcelona.

We'd travelled 1,819km (1,091 miles) averaging 55 miles per gallon, costing £85 in total in diesel Our flight was again on schedule and landed back at Stansted on time at 2315 courtesy of *Easy Jet*.
